Keynote Presenters

Prof. Deborah Cheetham Fraillon AO FAHA (Yorta Yorta/Yuin) soprano and composer is a respected human rights advocate and recognised thought leader on the importance of cultural authority in the Art Music space. Throughout a long and distinguished career Deborah has championed the voice and visibility of classically trained Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island musicians through her achievements a composer, performer and artistic director of the Australia's national First Nations Opera Company Short Black Opera (est. 2009) and Director of Dhungala Children's Choir (est. 2008).

In 2019 Cheetham Fraillon established the One Day in January project designed to develop and nurture Indigenous orchestral musicians. From this emerged Ensemble Dutala, Australia's first Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Chamber Ensemble which has led to the increased visibility and status of First Nations orchestral musicians in Australia.

As a composer Cheetham Fraillon's list of commissions for major ensembles and companies include works for the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Adelaide Symphony Orchestra, Australian String Quartet, West Australian Symphony Orchestra String Quartet, Rubiks Collective, Melbourne Ensemble, The ABC, The Sydney Philharmonia, Plexus Collective, Flinders Quartet Goldner Quartet, The Australian Ballet, Victorian Opera, The MPavilion Project, Chineke (UK) and Hawai'i Symphony.

Cheetham Fraillon's landmark compositions include Australia's first Indigenous opera *Pecan Summer* (2010), *Eumeralla, a war requiem for peace* (2018) and the ongoing multi layered, multi lingual chamber music series *Woven Song* (2018).

Deborah Cheetham Fraillon's career and achievements have been celebrated with a number of significant awards and commendations including: the Don Banks Music Award (2023), Queensland Government — Australian Women in Music Lifetime Achievement Awards (2022), the JC Williamson Lifetime Achievement Award (2021) and the Sir Bernard Heinze Memorial Award for service to music; Honorary Doctorate from the University of South Australia (2018). In the 2014 Queen's Birthday Honours List, Deborah was appointed as an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO), for distinguished service to the performing arts as an opera singer, composer and artistic director, to the development of Indigenous artists, and to innovation in performance and in 2022 she was appointed as a Fellow of the Australian Academy of the Humanities (FAHA)

In 2021 Deborah Cheetham Fraillon began a five year appointment as MSO First Nations Creative Chair and 2023 was appointed the inaugural Elizabeth Todd Chair of Vocal Studies at The Sydney Conservatorium of Music at the University of Sydney.



Dr. Candace Kruger

Dr. Candace Kruger is a Yugambeh yarrabilginngunn (song woman) and proud Kombumerri (Gold Coast) and Ngugi (Moreton Island) Aboriginal woman. She is an author, musician, composer, and educator, and is the founder and director of the Yugambeh Youth Choir, a south-east Queensland Indigenous language choir. Candace's research interests are in the fields of Indigenous musicology, Indigenous knowledges, and Indigenous education. Candace's co-composed Aboriginal song 'Morning Star and Evening Star' was the Australian Music Examinations Board (AMEB) Online Orchestra, National 2021 piece, and her children's book *Yalgan* Sun, written for the Gold Coast Suns AFL team, is a woven Yugambeh and English story. Candace is a lecturer in the School of Education and Professional Studies at Griffith University.

Kata Körtvési graduated from the Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music, Hungary in Music Education and Choral Conducting.

She was Assistant Lecturer in Solfege, Music-Theory, Score-Reading and Choir-Conducting at the Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music Teacher Training Institute. She worked as the Solfege Teacher of the Hungarian Radio Children's Choir. Kata was also the music director in drama and musical performances as well as the conductor at Sure Chamber Theatre, Szkéné Theatre, Jókai Mór Theatre and Jászai Mari Theatre.

She advocates for repertoire-based music education and her choral works support the development of vocal technique, musicianship skills, and artistry. Her music shows the merge of different lived experiences, languages and musical elements that continue to influence her composition writing.

Currently residing in Ontario, Canada, Dr. Wong is the Assistant Professor of Choral Studies at Western University, where she conducts Chorale and Les Choristes ensembles and teaches choral conducting. She holds a Doctor in Musical Arts (Choral Conducting) degree from the University of Toronto under the tutelage of Dr. Hilary Apfelstadt. She is a two-time recipient of the Elmer Iseler National Graduate Fellowship in Choral Conducting and was the 2019 Canadian Composer Feature for the Canadian Kodály Journal, Alla Breve. She is also the Choir Conductor for Organization of American Kodály Educators's 2024 National Conference's Concert Treble Choir.

Tracy collaborates regularly with choral organizations on conducting events, commissioned choral projects, and residencies, and her pieces are featured at numerous reading sessions. Tracy's choral works are available on her website, Cypress Choral Music (Canada), Graphite Publishing (US), Oxford University Press (UK) and Young Choral Academy (Malaysia) and have been performed by choirs at international competitions and festivals. 
